3a. Discussion Topics/ Presentations	<p>Collaborative Business Issues for Review:</p> <p>Space Location Update:</p> <p>1. State Collaborative is still looking for a new home in Raleigh to hold its meetings. The main reason for having the meetings in Raleigh is to ensure regular attendance by state government personnel.</p> <p>One option presented was the State Crime Commission which has space available for future State Collaborative meetings. Some of the positives are extensive parking available, conference calling capabilities, AV equipment, and staff available for trouble shooting technology. The SC had met there for a period of time in the past. Final decisions have not yet been made.</p> <p>2. Review of current fiscal year strategic priorities</p> <p>Every few months the State Collaborative reviews its strategic priorities to ensure it is moving in a forward direction and accomplishing its goals. In December Priority #1 was discussed at length. Thus the SC began with Priority #2 on Jan. 14th.</p> <p style="padding-left: 40px;">Priority #2---Support Implementation of Child and Family Teams (CFT)</p> <p style="padding-left: 40px;">1. <i>Share Child and Family Team Success Stories in our meetings and through our minutes and additional postings to the listserv.</i></p> <p>Current Status Update:</p> <p>What is currently happening to support the implementation of child and family teams:</p> <p>A) The State Collaborative's CFT Training Site, www.nccti.org, houses the Child and Family Team (CFT) training curriculum and provides certification of training for providers who facilitated CFTs. The website is free and available to anyone interested in learning about CFT however if one wants to be certified in CFT, to provide CFT services to children and families, they must pay to take the final test and receive proof of certification.</p> <p>(A question arose about how a parent, who uses the site for free, might be able to get certificate that they completed the training. This would be for individuals NOT intending on providing CFT facilitation services)</p> <p>B) Families United Provides CFT trainings in person: There are two levels: CFT 1—which provides information from the family perspective and CFT2—which reviews CFT1 and provides some tools for use in successful implementation. CFT2 is currently being revamped to provide more tool and implementation assistance. NCFU is looking to get training coaches involved to help maintain fidelity of the model over the long term.</p> <p>C) Sayso created a CFT training from the perspective of the youth for youth. The purpose of this SAYSO training is to young people with an understanding of their rights and how CFTs should be implemented. Through the training young people learn how to take ownership of the trainings and speak their voice. The training is currently available through the Sayso website.</p> <p>Action Steps:</p>

Educate the public, families, and young people so that they are able to facilitate their own CFTs and advocate for themselves.

- 1) Joanna Hughes will connect Sayso website link to Collaborative Training Site
- 2) Damie will connect Sayso website link to State Collaborative Training Site
- 3) Create a Facebook page that highlights CFT and State Collaborative
- 4) Provide all State Collaborative Members with a written document containing a 1 minute marketing speech explaining CFT, PBIS, and School Based Mental Health as well as examples of successes and contact information
- 5) Provide all State Collaborative Members with an advertisement template of CFT, PBIS, SC, School Based Mental Health for use in each other's newsletters to help promote dissemination of information about these initiatives.
- 6) Consider increasing the frequency of children and families presentations. At the present, SC hears from children and families in January and July.

2. Identify funding for parent/youth trainers that includes total costs for time, prep, tools and travel

Current Status: CFTs and System of Care are receiving funding through Mental Health Block Grant and System of Care Grants from Alamance, Mecklenburg, and Durham

When these funds go away, our CFT trainers are at risk of going away.

At the moment there is a need for more CFT2 Trainers--

But these Train the Trainer CFT2 trainings cost 1400-1500\$ and organizations (LMEs and provider organizations) are often not willing to pay for contract workers to attend such training. Train the Trainers for CFT 2 is only currently available through Biba Dobbins' organization (which is no longer associated with UNCG)

Action Steps:

- 1) Think of ways that we can add trainings to the grant applications.
- 2) Additional conversations about Training Trainers will occur and be lead by the Training and TA Committee of the State Collaborative
- 3) Fidelity of the Model needs to be maintained and thus coaching needs to be considered a requirement, not optional.

3. Promote incorporation of SOC principles into university training and community college curricula

Status Update: What is currently happening in higher education institutions?

SC Members listed the higher learning institutions they were associated with and their perceptions of how SOC was being taught.

- 1) ECU has no systematic education but some professors do emphasis in individual courses
- 2) NCSU not systematic but some professors do individual lessons
- 3) Elon, UNC Charlotte, Appp are doing trainings

Action Steps:

- 1) Go to professors about providing SOC/CFT/PBIS training to future professional
- 2) In SC's Annual Meeting provide a Higher Education track/seminar that would encourage professors and academics to educate their students on SOC, CFT, PBIS
