Introduction

The North Carolina Collaborative on Youth in Transition (NCCYT) began meeting as a result of interest generated by the US Department of Labor Shared Vision for Youth. The Shared Vision Initiative encouraged state agencies from Health and Human Services, Justice, Labor and Education to work together to better serve at risk youth. Since its inception in 2004, NCCYT has included a variety of public and private organizations, each of whom is committed to providing better outcomes for youth who exit our public systems: foster care, education, juvenile justice, health, and mental health. Reflecting on the Shared Vision Initiative, we recognized the importance of meeting and working together.

Mission Statement

The North Carolina Collaborative for Youth in Transition (NCCYT) is a group of concerned representatives from public and private agencies. We promote successful transitions to adulthood for youth who are or have been served by public agencies. Without adequate supports, many of these youth could easily become disconnected from opportunities, networks, supports and services that would enable them to thrive.

Primary Goals:

- To share and disseminate information through members to direct service providers;
- To identify and address overlaps and gaps in services;
- To promote interagency collaboration;
- To improve the provision of needed and available services; and,
- To advocate for improved services and improved outcomes in the areas of housing, education, employment, health, personal supports, and prevention of high risk behaviors.

The purposes of this directory of member resources are to share information about the Collaborative; identify and describe the services each member agency provides, and provide contact information for those seeking services. The goal of these efforts is that the youth of NC will experience improved services and outcomes. Users are encouraged to use this directory to document additional resources, so that they might share this information with others. Program descriptions and all other agency information are reported as provided by the agency.

The first section of the directory lists the agencies in alphabetical order. Each agency has a description including location, contact information, program description, eligibility, georgraphic area served and types of direct services provided.

Agencies are listed according to indirect services provided (policy development, technical assistance, advocacy services, training, publication development and dissemenation and program pilots), ages served and type of funding received.

Administrative Offices of the Courts, Court Improvement Program (CIP)

Focus of Program: The Court Improvement Program (CIP) was established by grant as part of a Federal initiative to support family preservation, prevention of child abuse, and services to families at risk. Its purpose is to assess and improve court processes related to foster care and adoption.

CIP funds are distributed to districts and are used for training and information programs for juvenile court and management assistance in developing and implementing court improvements, including working with judges to bring together juvenile court staff and others to improve court procedures and implement "best practices." Improvements in juvenile court policy, procedure and management in juvenile courts include:

- Implementing pilot projects that tested the effectiveness of using juvenile court "case managers" to process and handle child abuse and neglect cases. The implementation of these projects resulted in the reduction of the frequency and number of out-ofhome placements of children.
- Developing a juvenile court information collection and management system (JWise). It is envisioned that once this system is in place and running statewide, performance standards can be used to monitor, evaluate and improve the performance of our state's juvenile courts.
- Reforming state laws (Juvenile Code), policies and procedures (court rules) for juvenile court proceedings. These changes have been made to either comply with federal legislation and/or to make clarifications in the state laws governing juvenile court procedures.
- Supporting and cosponsoring comprehensive skill-based training for judges and attorneys.

- A personal, one-on-one relationship with a caring adult
- A marketable skill to use upon graduation
- An opportunity to give back to their peers and community.

Eligibility: varies by program

Focus of Program: Concern of Durham, Inc. offers both 24 residential treatment services which include transition and independent living services as part of the group home treatment and a separate transition program that does not have a group home residential component. This second service includes a Drop-in Center located in Chapel Hill, therapeutic foster care families recruited to work with the older adolescent, mentor homes recruited to work with homeless youth and scatter-site apartments.

Eligibility:

- Group Homes: Meet level III Medicaid criteria for admission to our group homes and meet CMSED criteria for availability for the at-risk funds to pay for room and board costs.
- Transition Program: 15-18 ¹/₂ years of age in need of support services to assist with the transition to young adulthood/independence. Criteria will include: mental health needs, DSS involvement and/or homelessness to qualify for HUD housing support.

Geographic Area Served: Primarily the Piedmont in the following counties: Durham, Orange, Chatham, Wake, Person, Alamance-Caswell and 5 County mental health.

Focus of Program: Offers youth a broad range of coordinated services to include opportunities for assistance in academic and occupation learning; development of leadership skills; and preparation for further education, additional training and eventual employment. The program blends traditional employment and training activities with a positive youth development approach.

Provides assessment of each youth that includes a review of academic and occupational skills as well as the services needed, and develops with the youth participant, an individualized service strategy, including identifying an age-appropriate career goal.

The following services are made available: Tutoring, study skill training; alternative secondary school; summer employment opportunities; paid and unpaid work experiences, including internships and job shadowing; occupational skill training; leadership development; supportive services; adult mentoring; follow-up services; comprehensive guidance and counseling.

Eligibility: Low-income plus one of six specified categories: deficient in basic literary skills; school dropout; homeless, runaway or foster child; pregnant or parenting; offender; or is an individual who requires additional assistance to complete an education program or to secure and hold employment.

Geographic Area Served: Services available statewide through a network of twenty-four local Workforce Development Boards/Youth Councils.

Eligibility: Individuals must be eligible as part of a target population to receive enhanced services. These include children/adolescents with severe emotional disorders, mental health/substance abuse disorders and developmental disabilities.

Focus of Program: The Department's involvement in the Collaborative is to gather information regarding services offered by state and local agencies for youth in transition. These services will be of use for youth throughout the continuum of services from community programming to community supervision to commitment and post release supervision.

Eligibility: There are no specific eligibility criteria. Youth interact with the Department of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention through Juvenile Crime Prevention Council-funded program services, community programs, juvenile court services, and the Center for the Prevention of School Violence.

Geographic Area Served: The Department of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention is a statewide agency. The vision of the Department is the creation of a seamless, comprehensive juvenile justice system which provides the most effective services to youth and their families at the right time in the most appropriate settings.

Focus of Program: Through the LEAs, DPI addresses the problems that homeless children and youth have faced in enrolling, attending and succeeding in school, by ensuring that each homeless child and youth has equal access to the same free, appropriate public education, including a public preschool education, as other children and youth. Local liaisons and state coordinators ensure that homeless children and youth have access to the educational and other services they need to enable them to meet the same challenging State student academic achievement standard to which all students are held. In addition, schools must provide homeless students these services in the mainstream school environment. States and districts are required to review and undertake steps to revise laws, regulations, practices or policies that may act as a barrier to the enrollment, attendance or success in school of homeless children and youth.

Eligibility: McKinney- Vento definition of Homeless, individuals who lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence and includes:

- children and youths who are sharing the housing of other persons due to loss of housing, economic hardship, or a similar reason; are living in motels, hotels, trailer parks, or camping grounds due to the lack of alternative adequate accommodations; are living in emergency or transitional shelters; are abandoned in hospitals; or are awaiting foster care placement
- children and youths who have a primary nighttime residence that is a public or private place not designed for or ordinarily used as a regular sleeping accommodation for human beings
- children and youths who are living in cars, parks, public spaces, abandoned buildings, substandard housing, bus or train stations, or similar settings; and
- migratory children (as such term is defined in section 1309 of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965) who qualify as homeless for the purposes of this subtitle because the children are living in circumstances described in clauses.
- unaccompanied youth' includes a youth not in the physical custody of a parent or guardian

Focus of Program: To provide resources and services designed to help older foster youth successfully transition to adulthood. An outcome-based program which allows for flexibility based on assessed individual need; life skills coaching, learning experiences, collaboration for services with other youth-serving agencies. Focus is on achievement of 7 outcomes: a safe and stable place to live; sufficient income to meet daily needs; adequate education and vocational training to secure employment; avoidance of high risk behaviors; postponing parenthood until emotionally and financially stable enough to parent; a personal support network of at least 5 caring adults who are willing to commit to a long-term relationship with the young adult; and access to needed health care.

Youth who are discharged from DSS custody after age 17 and youth who are adopted from foster care after age 16 are eligible for assistance with postsecondary educational and vocational training through the Education Training Voucher Program.

Eligibility: Youth and young adults ages 13 to 21 who are or were in DSS foster care after the age of 13. Eligibility ends on the youth's 21st birthday.

Geographic Area Served: State of North Carolina LINKS-eligible students attending college outside of North Carolina and young adults who aged out of care in NC may continue to be eligible for LINKS services and resources.
