# North Carolina Budget Impasse Continues:

The North Carolina legislature was in session briefly on Tuesday, January 14<sup>th</sup>, chiefly for the purpose of passing the budget. Republicans hoped to overturn the Governor's veto on the budget with the one extra vote necessary to do so. However, both parties did not sway and the budget veto could not be lifted. For this reason, the legislature has adjourned until April 28, 2020. This is the date that the short session will begin. Senate President ProTem Phil Berger held a press conference and stated that he did not believe that a compromise on the budget will be achieved in the short session. This would keep the budget at SFY18-19 levels through a continuing resolution.

# NC DHHS Published State-Funded BH/IDD Services Concept Paper:

The concept paper on <u>State-funded BH/IDD services</u> lays out a plan of action to create a more statewide, standardized approach to State funding.

#### Statewide Structure:

- Reiterates State funds are only available through the BH/IDD Tailored Plan.
- Lays out responsibilities of the BH/IDD Tailored Plans for some of those functions that have, in the past, been the Local Management Entity part of the LME/MCO.
- Proposes to create statewide eligibility criteria for State funds.
- States intent to create a statewide waiting list for State-funded services in all 3 disability areas—mental illness, substance use disorders, and intellectualdevelopmental disabilities.
- Notes the intent of NC DHHS to directly contract with providers to pilot "innovative approaches and administrative efficiency of certain State services."
- Charts the State-funded services including new focuses on recovery, meaningful day, peer support, high-fidelity wraparound for children, supported employment, residential and case management.
- Continues expectations for quality improvement in BH/IDD Tailored Plan services with monitoring and oversight by the State.

Differs from the Medicaid constructs of care management. Uninsured individuals
with mental illness and/or substance use disorders will receive case
management and individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities
receiving State-funded services will receive care management.

**Section on System of Care:** The paper endorses the continued use of the System of Care (SOC) model. The coordination of the local collaboratives will fall with the BH/IDD Tailored Plans (as it has with LME/MCOs). The paper notes this approach is for kids in the BH/IDD Tailored Plans.

# NC Awarded \$56 Million to Promote Child Well-Being:

Governor Cooper announced on January 9<sup>th</sup> that North Carolina had been awarded \$56 million from two federal grants for the next seven years to support children's well-being, improve access to early learning, and develop the early childhood workforce. The first grant, the Preschool Development Grant, \$40.2 million, invests in people who shape children's development, mainly parents and early childhood professionals. This grant provides job-embedded professional development and coaching. Additionally, the grant expands access to a nurse home visiting program for parents of newborns and supports families with children transitioning to kindergarten. The second grant, from the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services, implements the Integrated Care for Kids model. This model improves coordinated care across healthcare, schools, housing, and food sourcing.
