Highlight on a New Bill:

<u>S. 595</u>, Taskforce on Adverse Childhood Experiences, will establish a new task force to study the extent, nature, and impact of adverse childhood experiences with regard to North Carolina and make recommendations to address these impacts through State and local government with a particular focus on diversion from the criminal justice system. The Task Force membership will include representatives from DHHS, DPI, DPS, pediatricians, psychologists, social service directors, local boards of education and county commissioners. It does not include representation from youth and families or LME/MCOs. The bill was filed this week and referred to Senate Rules.

Highlight on New Law:

<u>SL 2021-7</u>, Summer Learning Choice for NC Families, was signed into law on April 9th. This new law is designed to assist students who have struggled during the pandemic and remote learning and could benefit from learning opportunities over the summer. The law authorizes the transfer of \$1.4 billion from the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief II to fund this opportunity. That includes funding for personnel, transportation for students and, to the extent funds are available, for residential schools. Each local school administrative unit will identify and prioritize atrisk students, consistent with G.S. 115C-105.41(a) (see below), for participation in the program.

§ 115C-105.41. Students who have been placed at risk of academic failure and transition plans.

(a) In order to implement Part 1A of Article 8 of this Chapter, local school administrative units shall identify students who are at risk for academic failure and who

are not successfully progressing toward grade promotion and graduation, beginning in kindergarten. Identification shall occur as early as can reasonably be done and can be based on grades, observations, diagnostic and formative assessments, State assessments, and other factors, including reading on grade level, that impact student performance that teachers and administrators consider appropriate, without having to await the results of end-of-grade or end-of-course tests.

Opportunity for Feedback! NC Medicaid Updates the Quality Strategy for Medicaid Managed Care:

NC Medicaid has published an <u>updated Quality Strategy</u>. The Quality Strategy includes the State expectations around care management, value-based payments, network adequacy, quality measures for Standard Plans and LM/MCOs to achieve. One update is to include the <u>Integrated Care for Kids (InCK) Initiative</u> that has been funded through SAMHSA.
