House Passes Their Budget Proposal:

As expected, the House expedited their budget process and passed their proposal for the biennium very quickly.

Medicaid expansion was not a part of either the Senate or House proposal. But they did include provisions that would *extend* Medicaid eligibility for specific populations.

- Medicaid eligibility would be extended for parents of children in foster care: <u>S. 93</u>
 was originally introduced to accomplish this and now it is a provision of both the
 House and Senate budget proposals.
- Medicaid eligibility would be continued for pregnant women for twelve months post-partum. This provision was only included in the Senate budget proposal.
- Extend Medicaid to charter schools. The charter schools will be responsible for the non-federal share and Medicaid reimbursable services can be provided in charter schools.

Of course, the beginning of the fiscal year on July 1 has already come and gone. State government agencies are operating based on the funding levels from the previous budget. Below are additional provisions related to MH/IDD/SUD services that are included in either the House or Senate budget proposals or are included in both proposals. When both proposals include the same provision, it is not in contention and is generally expected to be a part of the final proposal.
