Potential Legislation for Short Session:

The 2022 Short Session is set to begin on May 18, 2022. Bills that were introduced during the 2021 Long Session and met crossover or did not have to meet the crossover deadline (Ex: if they included funding), are still alive to be considered during the Short Session. There will be focus on changes to the budget that was passed last year for State Fiscal Year 2022-2023. We have gotten some indication of potential legislation for this session that would impact children's mental health services.

Deputy Secretary of Medicaid, Dave Richard, presented the following to the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Medicaid and Health Choice as legislation DHHS is seeking in the 2022 Short Session:

BH/IDD Tailored Plan:

- Language which enables and supports plan launch in Dec. 2022 including disenrollment and essential provider contracting
- Address transfer of fund balance in event of a Tailored Plan awardee dissolution
- Address technical changes i.e. solvency ranges

Children and Family Specialty Plan:

- Define features of plan including key terms, services covered, populations to be served –
- Identify type and number of entities which can operate plan
- Address provider network

Miscellaneous:

- Clarify caretaker relatives qualify to retain eligibility if meet conditions established in law
- Update language re: appeals of eligibility
- Change provider recredentialing from 5 to 3 years to align with national standards
- Address overpayment recoupments in managed care

Other Potential legislation:

The April edition of this update included a review of the recommendations from the Child Welfare and Family Well-Being Transformation Team, several of which required new funding to achieve the goal fully. They include:

Joint Legislative Committee on Access to Healthcare and Medicaid Expansion:

In the late April meeting of the committee members heard presentations on alternatives to Medicaid expansion that includes a voucher system for individuals at a certain level above the Federal Poverty Level (FPL) and about a State-based exchange similar to the federal healthcare marketplace. The Committee has not published a legislative recommendation on access to healthcare and Medicaid expansion. Presentations for these concepts are linked below:

Child Welfare Amendment to the 1115 Medicaid Waiver:

NC DHHS is offering webinars on the <u>child welfare amendment</u> to the 1115 Medicaid waiver that will be submitted to the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services for approval. Some points made:

- Focus on the Child and Family Specialty Plan
- Extends the eligibility to children and youth in foster care (authority came from 2021 Appropriations Act)
- Also includes parents/guardians/custodians and minor siblings of the child who are eligible for Medicaid
- NC DHHS is accepting comments and feedback during the webinars and at <u>Medicaid.NCEngagement@dhhs.nc.gov</u>. Comments must be received by May 23rd to be considered prior to submission of the amendment.

- As of May 1, the Healthy Opportunities Pilot in all pilot regions include housing and transportation services. Food services began on March 15 and interpersonal safety services will begin on June 15. For more information, see link here;.
- President Bidens <u>proclamation</u> for National Mental Health Awareness Month.
- Press release from Governor Cooper that out of \$34 million \$5 million to the NC Department of Health and Human Services to expand Youth Mental Health First Aid (MHFA) training. Youth MHFA training teaches adults who work with youth, including teachers and school staff, how to identify and support youth ages 12-18 who are experiencing mental health and substance use challenges and how to help in crisis situations. The funds will be used to certify new Youth MHFA instructors across the state and provide in-person or virtual Youth MHFA training to public and non-public school staff and other community members
- Governor Extends Healthcare Emergency Order. The order allows for, "...the NCDHHS Secretary flexibility to take actions to increase the health care workforce and to ensure continuity of existing operations in the state's hospitals, adult care homes, nursing homes, and other long-term care facilities. Professional licensing boards will continue to have authority to modify or waive requirements that would otherwise prevent qualified individuals, such as retired medical professionals and trained students, from providing care to COVID-19 patients."
